A new World Bank report sounds the alarm regarding the increasing impact of climate change that are threatening Ethiopia's development prospects. The drought of recent years—the most severe in 40 years—has been devastating for people in the arid pastoral areas. Simultaneously, flooding has damaged infrastructure and disrupted livelihoods in other parts of the country potentially pushing millions of Ethiopians into poverty.

- Finance State Minister Semereta Sewasew and Netherlands Ambassador to Ethiopia Henk Jan Bakker has signed a 10.6-million-Euros grant for the Cool Port Addis project Phase I. The Cool Port Addis Project I is designed to alleviate bottlenecks hindering Ethiopia's realization of its horticultural potential as stated in here.
- Ethiopia's economy grew 7.2% in 2023, with a 6.1% growth estimate. The services sector is resilient, but manufacturing is weak. According to UNDP report, the fiscal deficit/GDP ratio is 2.9%, and the government needs \$20 billion for reconstruction. Inflation remains high, and debt overhangs and repayments on Eurobonds are affecting poverty-related spending.

USAID Improves Nutrition for Women, Children, & Adolescent Girls with \$70 Million Community Nutrition Project

USAID Mission Director Scott Hocklander and the Minister of Health Dr. Lia Tadesse, on her last day as Minister, launched a new \$70 million Feed the Future Ethiopia Community Nutrition Activity aiming to address high malnutrition in the country.

The Community Nutrition Activity initiative targets women, children, and adolescent girls throughout their lives, aiming to break the intergenerational cycle of malnutrition. In addition, the Activity provides nutritional support in humanitarian emergencies by re-establishing routine services and interventions. The activity will be implemented by Family Health International 360 in over 155 woredas across various regions in Ethiopia. You can get more information in here.

How digital payments can change the lives of women in Ethiopia's coffee industry

Agriculture accounts for over a third of Ethiopia's economy and women make up 75% of the sector's labour force. They are the backbone of Ethiopia's agricultural sector, playing a crucial role in both food security and national economic stability. As reported on this article, the livelihoods of an estimated 15 million Ethiopians depend on coffee production. Despite their vital role, research reveals a substantial gender income gap, with women only receiving an estimated 34% of the income generated from coffee. This disparity stems from several factors, including limited access to land, credit and market opportunities.

Coffee regulator readies to execute EU's new deforestation-free rules

Europe is a key market for Ethiopian coffee exports, and the new legislation has sent shockwaves among industry players who fear it could result in falling revenues placing the entire industry at risk.

Ethiopia's coffee industry has formed a Committee to oversee the implementation of a new EU Deforestation-free regulation for coffee imported into the EU scheduled to come into effect this year.

The newly formed Committee is preparing to submit documents required by the EU, but Ethiopia, along with other coffee exporting countries, has requested the EU for an extension on the implementation of the anti-deforestation regulation, according to the news of The Reporter in this article.

From Djibouti's Grip to Kenya's Embrace

Ethiopia is set to send its first shipments through Kenya's Port Lamu, a move to diversify its trade routes and reduce reliance on Djibouti ports.

The move demonstrates Addis Abeba's proactive approach to addressing logistical and security issues plaguing its main trade route through Djibouti. Djibouti ports have served as the main entrance point for fertilizer inbound to Ethiopia, costing around 1.5 billion dollars annually.

Logistics industry expresses concerns over new directive permitting private sector participation in dry ports

The Ethiopian Ministry of Transport and Logistics is drafting a directive to allow private sector involvement in the dry port scheme, aiming to liberalize the logistics industry. However, logistics actors have raised concerns that the proposed directive fails to consider practical realities on the ground.

The directive outlines specific land and infrastructure requirements for each type of terminal, including container terminals, dry bulk freight terminals, logistics parks, and logistics hubs. The directive also outlines equipment requirements for each terminal, with half of the machines being leased.

753 Tons Of Fish Harvested From GERD Artificial Lake In 7 Months

Deputy Head of the Benishangul-Gumuz Region Agriculture Bureau revealed that some 753 tons of fish have been harvested from the artificial lake of the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam (GERD). He also mentioned that the production was achieved by four licensed fishery unions in the last seven months.

In <u>this</u> article of <u>Fana Broadcasting Corporate</u>, it is stated that Benishangul-Gumuz Region Agriculture Bureau granted licenses to 38 youth unions to engage in the sector. Furthermore, it indicates that proactive measures have been taken to preemptively address any potential challenges related to market connectivity for these unions.

Moth infestations threaten flower exporters' largest market



European lawmakers are proposing stricter inspection procedures for roses imported into the EU from Ethiopia to combat the False Codling Moth (FCM) infestation. The moth, native to Sub-Saharan Africa, feeds on products like cotton, citrus fruits, peppers, roses, macadamia and maize.

The EU Parliament is concerned about the threat, with estimates suggesting over a quarter of Europe's citrus yields are at risk. The rule will apply to fresh roses from Ethiopia and Kenya and the inspection rate will increase to 25% of the consignments arriving in the European Union. The new EU inspection rate of 25% for roses imported from Ethiopia and Kenya will come into force decision on the first of May 2024.

As indicated in <u>this article</u>, experts warn that increased inspection frequency and larger sampling sizes could impact delivery timeliness and freshness.



Early Warning System that Empowers Pastoralists Launched

The User-Centered Integrated Rangeland and Water Monitoring and Early Warning System in Pastoral Areas of Ethiopia project has launched a system to empower pastoralists to make informed decisions, manage risks, and strengthen their resilience against climate change impacts.

The project, which covers 63% of Ethiopia's land mass, is critical for fostering livelihood resilience by providing near-real-time information on water and pasture resources. The project aims to provide near-real-time water, pasture, and climate information to livestock producers for risk management, decision-making, and drought planning.

The project is currently piloted in Borena, Oromia Regional State, and is expected to expand to Somali and Afar regional states in the coming two years. The project represents a commitment to protecting the environment, economy, and communities. Read more in here.
