

Projects in the Spotlight

Projects in the spotlight

Even during the challenging year 2020, our team contributed to some great projects. In Nigeria for example we were able to leverage on earlier projects, studies and missions to come to a more integrated Nigerian Netherlands Seed Partnership. Follow our channels for more information on that soon. Together with our colleagues at RVO we also try to work with both Dutch and local private sector players, knowledge institutes and/or NGO's to formulate impactful activities that can be co-financed by the Dutch governments. That can be in the form of so-called Impact Clusters or SDGP proposals. Over the last year we have developed these kind of activities in all our 3 countries. Here we list just some of them. We will regularly update our page at AgroBerichtenBuitenland. For a more extensive overview, follow this LINK. In the meantime, we hope that these examples will inspire or otherwise give food for thought. We mainly want to underline that we are very much open to discuss potential project with anyone interested.

Insect 4 Feed Impact Cluster -Nigeria

If we could exchange fish oil or other animal protein in feed for insects that would be a major game changer for the global food system. Therefore we support the <u>Insect 4 Feed Impact Cluster</u> in Nigeria. It is a four-year project, funded by the Netherlands Enterprise Agency and starting in 2021 with a focus on the development of insect protein for the feed industry in Nigeria. The project connects Dutch expertise to the Nigerian thriving animal protein industry, infusing and catalyzing environmentally sustainable approaches to the agri-food industry as a whole.

Key partners involved are, NGN-pro, Feed Calculator, IITA-BIP, University of Ibadan, QIFFAN, Heineken (Nigerian Breweries).

Accessible Soils And Sustainable Environments -Ghana

Land tenure is an enormously important theme throughout Africa. The Accessible Soils And Sustainable Environments (ASASE) project is a four-year project in the Ghanaian cocoa landscape. It is co-funded by the Netherlands Enterprise Agency (RVO) as part of the Sustainable Development Goals Partnership (SDGP). Driven by a belief that a thriving, climate-smart cocoa sector is possible, this project will work with 5,000 farmers across Ghana's cocoa producing areas. Using a landscape approach, the ASASE project intervenes on 3 levels: working together with cocoa farmers, their rural communities and in local forest remnants. Among other interventions and for the first time in Ghana, cocoa farmers receive access to subsidized land tenure and tree tenure documentation at large scale to improve their security in their farmland.

Hortivoire Impact Cluster -Côte d'Ivoire

For Côte d'Ivoire to become more food secure it is important to grow more healthy and accessible food in the country. The Hortivoire Project is a four-year project being implemented since 2020 in Cote d'Ivoire, West Africa. The total cost of the project is € 940,000 with a total requested grant amount of € 450,000 and granted by RVO. The Project objective is to train farmers in better and more sustainable practices of producing local vegetables 'hors sol' via the integrated INNOFER model (greenhouse substrate horticulture). The Dutch partners AGRIFER, Rijk Zwaan (specialized in hybrid seeds) and Van Iperen (specialized in fertilizers) are active in this Impact Cluster under the name HortIvoire. The project is coordinated by Resilience BV and supported by the Dutch embassy in Abidjan, RVO and the regional office of the Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality in Accra (Ghana).
