The Government has approved Resolution No. 964, which establishes the procedure for importing seed and planting material not included in the Register of Plant Varieties of Ukraine but listed in the Plant Variety List of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD).

This was announced by the Ministry of Agrarian Policy and Food of Ukraine.

"The resolution was adopted in accordance with Ukraine's fulfillment of international commitments to ensure compliance with the Seed Schemes of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD)," clarified the

The document approves the conditions and procedures for the import of seeds and planting material of a variety, including:

- Confirmation of the information about the variety included in the OECD Plant Variety List, those agricultural plants, the seed certification schemes of which Ukraine has joined. Obtaining consent from the competent authority of the country of variety registration for seed reproduction.
- Importing seed and planting material of a variety not included in the State Register of Plant Varieties suitable for propagation but listed in the OECD Plant Variety List, those agricultural plants, the seed certification schemes of which Ukraine has joined. This includes reproduction and export beyond the state borders.

Grants for Orchards and Greenhouses: Farmers Receive Over UAH 400 Million this Year



Nine more agricultural enterprises have received approximately UAH 25 million for the development of orchards, berry farms, vineyards, and

greenhouse farming within the government's "eWork" grant program

The Ministry of Agrarian Policy and Food of Ukraine announced this in a statement.

"This year, a total of 106 farms received state assistance amounting to UAH 403.9 million. Of this, UAH 324.7 million was allocated to 90 enterprises for the development of orchards, berry farms, and vineyards. Additionally, UAH 79.2 million was disbursed to 16 farms for greenhouse development," the ministry noted.

Since the program's inception, UAH 452.9 million has been paid to 115 business entities. Specifically, UAH 359.7 million was received by 97 farms for the development of orchards, berry farms, and vineyards, while UAH 93.2 million went to 18 entrepreneurs for greenhouse projects.

This year, grants have been fully disbursed to 83 farms for the "Own Orchard" project and to 14 farms for the "Own Greenhouse" project.

Support for Ukraine - The Best Financial Investment

Niall Ferguson, a British historian, writer, and journalist who is a professor of history at Harvard University and a senior fellow Stanford University, made this statement during the annual Yalta European Strategy (YES) meeting, as reported by Ukrinform.



"Some people in the US — will say that investment in the Ukraine war is a waste of money. But this is not the case — this war is an extraordinarily efficient war with a decent prospect of success even without the miracles that might have been good from the counter-offensive. In fact, it is the best value for money. Ensuring Ukraine's national security is the best financial investment," — said Niall Ferguson at the annual meeting of the Yalta European Strategy (YES) "The Future Is Being Decided in Ukraine", organised by YES.

The Senior Fellow believes that Ukraine's loss in the war will be a disaster not only for Ukraine but for the whole world, as a new Cold War will be complicated for the West to sustain financially.

"We cannot afford to lose this war. If, two years from now, our attention span has wavered. If the Russian offensive is being reported on, this is not just a tragedy for Ukrainians but for Europe and the whole world. The Pacific region is also turbulent. The cost of a hypothetical reconquest of Taiwan is much higher than the price of supporting Ukraine. Both the United States and its allies will not be able to financially cover the costs of a new Cold War," Niall Ferguson summarised.

Vegetable Harvest Encourages to Expand in This Direction Next Year



The company "PAEK" LLC has begun harvesting early variety onions, Verdzhilio, on its fields

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Ukraine Triples Frozen Raspberry Exports to the USA



According to EastFruit analysts, Ukraine has tripled its exports of frozen raspberries to the US market in the first half of 2023. This achievement marks Ukraine's entry into the top ten largest exporters of frozen raspberries to the USA, securing the 8th position, despite traditional leaders like Mexico, Chile, and Serbia slightly reducing their export volumes.

Mexico, for example, exported 340 times more raspberries to the US in the first half of 2023 than Ukraine did during the same period. This surge in frozen raspberry exports from Ukraine to the USA, coupled with positive growth trends, is a significant breakthrough, given that the volumes are still relatively small.

Andriy Yarmak, an economist at the UN Food and Agriculture

Organization, notes that even though Ukraine's volumes are not yet substantial, the positive dynamics are promising. He points out that when comparing raspberry prices between the US and the European Union, the difference is substantial. While prices in the EU have dropped by an average of two or more times, prices in the US have only decreased by 10-15%. This indicates that US raspberry importers are willing to pay a high price for quality products.

It's worth noting that Ukraine's journey into the US raspberry market began in 2021, with nearly 80% of the global frozen raspberry import revenue originating from the USA and Canada. Ukraine has traditionally focused on supplying raspberries to Poland, which then re-exports them to the EU, the UK, the USA, and Canada, retaining a significant portion of the added value.

However, in 2023, a trend towards further processing of raspberries has emerged in Ukraine, where the country began exporting "frozen raspberry raw materials" to Poland. Yarmak believes that if Poland decides to ban imports of frozen and fresh raspberries from Ukraine, Ukrainian exporters should focus their attention on the USA, Canada, and Japan.

Ukraine's unique soil and climate conditions make it capable of producing top-quality raspberries, and the relatively minor additional efforts required for freezing, sorting, and processing could lead to significant returns. Furthermore, the additional income earned by exporters can be reinvested in improving efficiency and expanding raspberry plantations in the country.

In the first half of 2023, the USA imported 23,500 tons of frozen raspberries, nearly 9,000 tons less than during the same period in 2022 and 3,200 tons less than in the first half of 2021.
